Dear friends and supporters of Children's Future International

What a difficult year 2020 has been for so many people around the world. However, despite facing enormous obstacles, Children's Future International (CFI) has continued to grow, develop and thrive just like the children and families we support.

CFI has continued to evolve, increasingly focusing its efforts on reducing dependency, expanding sustainability (for families and the organization alike) and increasing participation. We are doing this because the true measure of the success of any nonprofit organization is to strengthen its community such that it no longer requires the organization's services, thereby making itself redundant. That continues to be our ultimate goal.

This year, we began a range of new initiatives, including being the first organization in Cambodia to implement the Duke of Edinburgh Award; completing our community-based Harm Prevention sessions; running a range of innovative programs such as Future Goals to help young women plan their careers; and partnering with Enabling Leadership (an Indian NGO) to deliver football-based leadership programs in public schools.

You might also notice our annual report looks different to previous years. That is because thanks to a partnership with University of Colorado Denver, a group of English writing students chose our annual report as their project this year and wrote and designed this year's report with data and information from the team in Cambodia. We think they did a great job!

On behalf of the board, I would like to thank the Cambodian team for their commitment and high-quality work. And finally, thank you! None of this work would be possible without the dedication and support of our donors, funders and supporters. Thank you for the important role you play in the CFI family.

Our Story

Children's Future International (CFI) is a United States registered charity located in rural Cambodia outside of Battambang. Started by Jenny Ciucci and Andrew Wolff in 2009, their focus was to bring education, health care, and community development to an impoverished region of an underdeveloped and poverty-stricken country.

Today, we support young people between the ages of 5-22 and their families through three comprehensive programs in rural Battambang. These students would not have the resources to attend school without CFI's support, and consequently would be - and in many cases, were - at high risk of exploitation, including human trafficking and child labor. Without support, all CFI students would face the risks and hardships of living a life of poverty in an underdeveloped country. This includes malnutrition, preventable disease, domestic violence and sexual abuse, as well as child labor and illegal migration.

EDUCATION


Children's Future International's Supplementary Education Program provides children and youth with the education and skills they need to have access to fruitful, productive lives with support from our Learning Center and in local public schools. We cover all costs required to access education, including school uniforms and materials (books and pens), and bicycles. In doing so, we can remove any financial barriers to students attending education full-time and enable some of the most resource-poor families to access similar opportunities open to others.



Child Well Being

A future where EVERY Cambodian child is safe, healthy, educated and thriving

We supported 253 children and 115 families this year



We reintegrated 22 young people from orphanages back to family-based care



Started a targeted girl's program, Future Goals (designed by our partner Free To Shine), to help young women plan for career choices





Prevented 10 children from entering orphanages and completed 232 Safety and Risk Assessments

Continued to sponsor students to complete university and vocational education and provided young people with internships, with an enhanced competency-based framework



As part of our approach to reducing dependency this period, we transferred 80 children / young people from high-intensity social work services to reduced-intensity educational services. In addition to this, we also safely exited 122 children / young people from CFI services





This period, we received 122 referrals through our robust intake process; we identified 104 as being of the highest need and accepted them into our services

We delivered harm prevention workshops to 1150 people in two communes of Ek

Phnom District, collecting data for two pieces of research





Ran a range of brief interventions such as positive parenting, safe migration and alcohol awareness sessions. These psychoeducational programs help prevent family separation and keep children safe.

Cambodia's First Duke of Edinburgh Award Winner!

This is Chanthou, the first person in Cambodia to complete the bronze Duke Of Edinburgh Award. This award helps young people develop confidence and leadership skills and is available in over 140 countries in the world. CFI is the first organisation to offer this award in Cambodia. Chanthou, along with 11 of her peers, has now completed this award. Chanthou completed her award by developing her skills in tennis, learning to sew, supporting students' attendance at local schools and planning and going on an adventurous journey.





IMPACT DUE TO COVID-19






CFI proactively responded to the COVID-19 pandemic:


- community hygiene and protection training and awareness,
- provided personal protective equipment, and
- ensured child protection remained a priority

All during a public health crisis when attention could easily have been diverted elsewhere.

CFI also reacted to COVID-19 and school closures with virtual teaching and exam preparation support. We delivered education in new and innovative ways to support students, based on what we learned through the COVID-19 school closures.

- Broaden our work supporting families who have returned from migration








- Continue to work in partnership with local authorities (upskilling, not replacing) by building community participation

Revenue & Expenses


Total Revenue (\$402,377)*


